The word, "hospice" is from the Latin *hospitium* meaning "hospitable reception, entertainment; hospitality, bonds of hospitality, relationship of guest and host (Etymology Online)." At its heart then, since the 10th century C.E., a hospice has been a resting place where one is warmly welcomed. At a hospice a host gladly invites one in to sit a spell, put their feet up, and participate in a meal and conversation.

One thousand years later nothing has changed. Hospice continues to offer a resting place, somewhere to breathe deep, take stock, and be renewed by the compassion of the host. In the case of HSCD, the hosting happens, not in our house, but in *your* home, or in Bethany's home, or in Daysland Hospital's home... Through our volunteers, we bring Hospice to the individuals and families that need it most.





EDUCATION COMMITTEE

The Education Committee has a very active group of 5 members. The chair is Pam Cummer who works along with Helen Samm, Miriam Neufeld, Jessica Johnson and Joy LeBlanc. We meet on an as needed basis, usually every other month for an hour.

This year the committee decided to continue with hosting Death Café's at the Camrose Public Library on the third Thursday of every month. We meet in the Irving Room on the lower level of the library from 7-8:30 PM. We have a group of individuals who have volunteered to facilitate the gatherings and thanks to our wonderful core of volunteers, Joy is able to recruit people to supply cookies, tea and coffee and help with set up. Participation varies from 4-20 participants; the conversation is always lively, interesting and stimulating. The cafes provide an avenue for individuals to talk openly about their personal feelings about death and related topics in a safe and nonjudgmental environment. It is not a grief support group, but resources for that purpose are always offered if the needs arise. The committee has decided to continue with the cafes for the months of May and June-please look for a special Death Café event in June! It will be advertised in the local papers.

The Education Committee has hosted movie nights in the past and this spring we are showing a movie entitled "SOLACE: Wisdom of the Dying". This movie grew out of the director's intimate experiences with people facing the end of their lives. The director is Camille Adair, a hospice nurse, who has worked closely with patients, families and health care professionals to provide end of life care. The movie offers a rich blend of perspectives from experts and the practical and authentic wisdom from people facing their own mortality. Movie night starts at 6:30PM on Tuesday May 29th in the Irving Room, lower level of the Camrose Public Library. This is a free event and we encourage you to come out, have some popcorn and enjoy the movie!

The Education and Volunteer Committees are working together to provide a Volunteer Training Weekend in late April. This is our first attempt at having a one weekend training session; after which we will assess and evaluate the weekend. Our hopes are to take this training program out to some sites in the Camrose area.

The committee has also put together a powerpoint presentation about the Hospice Society of Camrose and District. With the help of Bill Harder, HSCD Program Coordinator, we will soon have it ready for any interested committee members to take out to community groups asking for presentations from our society. We will soon present it to the committee, and have a "training session" after which we will be ready to meet any and all requests we have for presentations!

The month of May we are planning a volunteer appreciation supper and evening for our volunteers. Abraham Lincoln stated, **Nothing in this world is impossible to a willing heart.** Because of the willing hearts of our volunteers we have accomplished nearly impossible feats. We thank you from the bottom of our hearts. Our volunteer coordinator, Joy LeBlanc, will report on what those accomplishments actually are.

I will speak for the NavCARE program though. NavCARE stands for connecting, accessing, resourcing and engaging. Volunteers are connected with seniors who have a chronic illness, with the intent of making them aware of the resources that are available in our community and connecting them with the appropriate one that will increase their quality of life. This program started out as a research project with the U of A Faculty of Nursing with the hopes that it would be sustainable. Fortunately the HSCD saw it as a valuable fit for our already existing volunteer program and are now implementing it. We have, at present, 7 seniors and 6 volunteers active in the program. We do have the video posted on the website that explains it further.

Once again, thank you to our volunteers and to all who support this worthy cause of making the world a better place by sharing your hearts!








I have been a member of the Hospice Society since 2012. I became a member of the Volunteer Committee and worked closely with the Hospice's founder's Bev Drever and Treva Olson. The first education training had been completed. People wanted to volunteer with the dying. St. Mary's Hospital opened their doors and we were welcomed as volunteers there. Our volunteer program has grown from 6 volunteers to 46 volunteers. They provide comfort to people in Bethany, Seasons, Daysland Hospital and Providence Centre, Wetaskiwin Hospital, and in family homes.

Our volunteer's greatest gift is their presence. They are comfortable sitting quietly for hours with someone who is dying. They will read, play music, or listen to stories. They come to give family respite or if there is no family they become "family". Our volunteers also visit people who need someone because they have a life limiting illness. The volunteers are trained to companion those who are grieving. Volunteers truly are instrumental in "Building a Compassionate Community".

I am often asked what drew me to Hospice work. I have a nursing background. I worked with children living with Cystic Fibrosis. The courage of these families as they faced an uncertain future was inspiring. Looking after people in my family and friends as they were dying made we want to help others who were facing the same challenges. The volunteers I work with tell me over and over again how privileged they feel to be able to be a loving presence to people as they make this final journey. The volunteers often say that they receive more than they give because it is such a "sacred time".

I accepted the Volunteer Coordinator position because just as the volunteers love being with the dying and others who need their help, I love serving the volunteers. As a former manager and educator in the health care system I had skills that I could bring to this position so was happy to use them to help grow the volunteer program. To me the volunteer program is the heart of Hospice and it is a joy to keep it beating with love.
